What Impact has the Computers for Schools Program had on your School?

A school in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia was asked the question, "What impact has the Computers for Schools program had on your school?" The response received was that the program has touched all students in the school. The school that answered the question was Admiral Westphal Elementary School, Dartmouth, Nova Scotia.

The computers received by the school have been used to create a computer lab where whole classes are able to work together on projects. Search stations were

set up in the library to be used as a research tool, and to access the web-based library index. The school also noted,

"For many of our students, the only access they have to technology is at the school."

Admiral Westphal was able to replace what they described as "a hodgepodge" of computers with a "more consistent level of working technology that allowed our students and teachers to work together without the high degree of frustration."

"The level of technology integration that we have been able to achieve would not have come as quickly or as efficiently if it had not been for the recycling program."

Computers for Schools, Nova Scotia is happy we were able to make such an impact on a school and its students.

Computers for Schools, co-founded in 1993 by Industry Canada and the Telecom Pioneers, refurbishes computers and related equipment donated by governments and businesses. These computers are distributed across Canada to schools, libraries and registered not-for-profit learning organizations.

45,000 Celebration Event

Computers for Schools, Nova Scotia celebrated the distribution of its 45,000th refurbished computer. The event took place on Tuesday, May 13, 2008 at the Bicentennial School in Dartmouth. On hand to mark the occasion were representatives from the Federal and Provincial Governments, and members of the private sector and non-profit sector including Aliant and novaknowledge.

During the celebration, the Bicentennial School was presented with 22 computers to be used in the classrooms and library. The Halifax Regional School Board superintendent Carole Olsen, who was present for the celebration and presentation stated,

"I want to thank both our government and business partners for their continued support of Computers for Schools. In every one of our schools there is a good chance students have learned, or are in the process of learning, basic computer skills on

computers donated through this program. It is helping our students and teachers bridge the digital divide."

In a statement released prior to the event, Federal Industry Minister Jim Prentice stated,

"CFS continues to be an innovative and smart investment that ensures Nova Scotia students and other learners have a technology-rich education, and in these times of changing technology and rising educational skill requirements, CFS is more important than ever."

The Department of Education has been a partner with Computers for Schools, Nova Scotia since the program began in 1994. They have continually maintained their involvement and support for the program by providing workshops, operational space and support staff. Education Minister, Karen Casey recognizes Computers for Schools as a unique partnership, involving the Department of Education, novaknowledge, Industry Canada, Aliant Pioneer Volunteers and others.

"The Department of Education is proud to have been an active partner since the program started in 1994", she said. "Computers for Schools is a key component of our strategy to refresh technology in schools. I am also pleased that some of the refurbished computers are also being provided to libraries, literacy groups and other not-for-profit organizations."

The event was a great success. Thank you to everyone who attended for helping us celebrate 45,000 computers.

How Can I Receive Computers?

The type of organization you are will determine if, and how you may request computers from Computers for Schools, Nova Scotia. Below is a list of organizations provided with computers and how you can request refurbished computers from our program:

Public Schools—Contact the technology department of your regional school board and submit a request for computers. All requests must be approved and submitted by the principal of the school.

First Nations Schools—Contact the Atlantic Canada First Nations Help Desk at 1-877-484-7606.

Our minimum standard is based on what is useable in schools and input from each of the School Boards within Nova Scotia is given to assist in this process. Any equipment that meets the minimum standard will be accepted, refurbished and given, free of charge to schools, (including public, private and First Nations), and libraries and related institutions across Nova Scotia. Your efforts to recycle this equipment will aid us in continuing to help our schools with the IT technology that they need and will also help the Environment by diverting the equipment from the landfill.
